Potted History

A drive through part of the Tallarook Ranges was our April activity. It was interesting to view Mt Piper, near Broadford, from afar. Mt Piper supports a unique and highly diverse butterfly community. At least thirty five species of butterflies and eight species of day-flying moth are found in the area, giving it the highest known diversity of Lepidoptera in Victoria. We also went to the Murchison Gap Lookout which gives a panoramic view towards the east. At the Strath Creek Falls Grahame walked to the viewing area and is determined to visit again with his family. A little bit of history was covered as we stopped to read about the Italian internees and their wood cutting efforts for Melbourne during WWII.





Our May excursion will centre on Nagambie. Bernie has prepared the itinerary for the day which includes visits to the Nagambie Historical Society, Kirwan's Bridge, Scotchman's Hill and the Tahbilk Winery.

Thursday Matinee

FUNGI WORKSHOP

Fungi expert, Alison Pouliot is coming to Seymour to present a workshop on 11 June 2022

Alison has recently published a book called 'Wild Mushrooming" and featured in a segment on Gardening Australia a few months ago.

We are really lucky to have this engaging presenter visiting us in Seymour.

This 3.5 hour workshop, with both theoretical and practical components, will introduce participants to the diversity, ecology and curiosities of the Kingdom Fungi specific to the fungi found around Seymour and surrounds but, also, within the wider Australian context.



It includes a one hour interactive session around specimen display where participants will learn the basics of fungus identification, fungal ecology and the cultural history of fungi. Fungi specimens from the local area will be displayed, discussed and examined.

The edibility and toxicity of fungi will also be discussed characterises used to identify fungi in the field and understand their ecological significance in local ecosystems

Following the indoor session will be an outdoor foray through local habitat types to search for specimens of interest. Participants will learn to recognise the various diagnostic attributes.
