The Melbourne International Flower and Garden Show had something for everyone!

Not only were there floral displays, plants and gardens but there were also exhibits, workshops, ideas for landscaping and objet d'art.

The cleverly designed award winning gardens were inspirational as well as sending a powerful message about our connection and responsibility to the environment.

Sustainability practices were of great interest inspiring us with ideas for reducing organic material going to landfill.

This year for the first time the Show remained open until dark for visitors to wander the extensive grounds and witness some of the best landscape and floral displays lit up at night.

Also, this year was the first time an Aboriginal heritage garden was included to remind us of the ecological and cultural significance of the land and the importance of the remaining areas of native

vegetation.

Melbourne's beautiful autumn weather was the icing on the cake!

Local Current Affairs

Grahame Sharples, one of the participants in LCA, has sent the following report and has suggested we change the name of this "class" to *What do we have here?* We are wondering whether there is anyone else out there would be interested in getting to know more about Seymour.

Recent meetings of the group have discussed some of the facilities, services and locations around Seymour which may be little known to the general population. Following an open U3A meeting with a guest speaker at the Pioneer Park, last week we went for a drive around the north eastern part of the town looking at various landmarks, businesses, services and structures. This took us from the railway station car park out along Wimble Street and along Delatite Road past GV Water, up to the GVW sewerage farm and over the hill to the major new bridge works over the railway line at Avenel Road, with much discussion and observations along the way. Returning into town via new housing, Abdallah Road and the railway heritage yards and engine turntable.

This week was a completely different focus with a visit to the remarkable facility of Our Place which is the Seymour Family and Children's Centre in Stewart Street, next to the Seymour College entrance. This is an impressive new 2019 building with two kindergarten rooms, community areas and an infant welfare and medical centre. An adult vaccination service is run from here by the shire, with a nurse practitioner. A full week's program of activities and services is run for the families & children. 
From here the U3A group went to the Community House in Anglesey Street where we met with the enthusiastic manager Krystal Russell, who has been here for three months and is expanding services. She has special qualifications in early learning and as well as activities for adults, or you can just drop in for a chat sometimes hear an interesting guest speaker. The building is undergoing ongoing renovations and is already smart inside. Look out for the high childproof door handles!

Next door, on the corner is SEED, a hub for women. The somewhat misleading acronym stands for "Sustaining Economic Empowerment and Dignity for Women." Again, this is a government building but the free community service is being run by the Brotherhood of St Laurence to help school leavers thru to older women [no men on staff here] with a wide variety of advice and direction concerning anything that falls under a financial heading. Not just difficulties but such things as job interviews and applications, superannuation, loans etc. The aim is to improve their work options and capacity to make good decisions early and avoid problems later. Your Fascinating Brain

We have continued to discuss (and practise) how memory works. Here are a few words from Lisa Genova, author of the book "Remember":

Creating a memory takes place in four basic steps:

Encoding - Your brain captures the sights, sounds, information, emotion and meaning of what you perceived and paid attention to and translates all this into neurological language.

Consolidation – your brain links the previously unrelated collection of neural activity into a single pattern of associated connections.

Storage – This pattern of activity is maintained over time through persistent structural and chemical changes in those neurons.

Retrieval – You can now, through the activation of these associated connections, revisit, recall, know, and recognise what you learned and experienced.
